

Job Vacancy and Wage Survey, 1st Quarter 2025

Nova Scotia Highlights

In the first quarter of 2025, the number of job vacancies (12,735) in Nova Scotia dropped by 10.2% compared to last quarter (14,180) and by 10.9% compared to the same quarter last year (14,285).


The job vacancy rate (2.9%) fell by 0.3 percentage points compared to last quarter and 0.4 percentage points compared to one year ago.



Note: The job vacancy rate is the number of job vacancies expressed as a percentage of labour demand (the sum of occupied and vacant jobs. 1

Job Vacancy Trend


- The number of job vacancies was on a downward trend since Q2 2023, with a slight uptick in Q2 2024, gradually returning to pre-pandemic levels. Compared to a year ago, vacancies have declined by 10.9% in Q1 2025.
- The average offered hourly wage has been steadily increasing in recent quarters, despite some fluctuations, rising by 2.8% from 2024 Q1 to 2025 Q1.

Industry Analysis

 In Q1 2025, the highest job vacancy rates were in "health care and social assistance" (4.6%), "Accommodation and food services" (4.3%) & "Other services" (4.3%). For comparison, the provincial average job vacancy rate was 2.9% in Q1 2025.





 Vacancy growth rate, year over year, varies across industries. "Accommodation and food services" experienced the largest expansion at 25%, followed by "finance and insurance" (+17%) and "administrative and support, waste management and remediation services" (+8%).

Wages

year-over-year comparison

- During Q1 of 2025, all economic regions posted higher offered wage for vacant positions compared to the previous year except for Cape Breton (-1.0%). This was led by North Shore (+9.5%). It is followed by Southern (+2.5%), Halifax (+2.3%), and the Annapolis Valley (+2.2%).
- The average offered hourly wage increases, on average, with the educational requirements of the offered position. Positions requiring high school diploma (+3.6%), non university certificate (+6.6%), and university below bachelor's (+21.9%), had the highest growth in wages between Q1 of 2024 and Q1 of 2025. In contrast, positions requiring no minimum level of education (-3.3%) and a bachelor's degree (-1.4%) offered lower wages.
